

## 2004 Pacific Northwest VHF+ Conference date, location set

Mark your calendar now! The 2004 Pacific Northwest VHF+ Conference will be held October 1-2 at the Best Western Hallmark Inn Moses Lake. You won't want to miss it. Conference registration will open August 1, 2004. Cost of the conference will be \$25 per person, including a buffet lunch. Registration details will be forthcoming in the June issue of Noise Floor.

Special conference lodging rates of \$55 per night (one queen-size bed; \$60 for two queen-size beds) have been negotiated. Make your reservations early as the block of rooms with special rates will be held by the hotel only until September 1, 2004. After that date, rooms will only be available at the regular rate of \$75.

To make a reservation, call the Hallmark Inn directly at (509) 765-9211 and ask for the special "PNWVHFS Conference" rate. Using the Best Western toll-free number or web site to make reservations may not guarantee you the special conference rate.

The PNWVHFS Board of Directors recently approved the addition of an Eastern Washington location to the Pacific Northwest VHF+ Conference schedule rotation and Director Bob Lee (N7AU) did a great job of finding a great facility in which to hold it. He and PNWVHFS President Lynn Burlingame visited the site and worked out the details with the hotel.

Traditionally, the conference has rotated between three locations; Bend, Oregon; Portland, Oregon/Vancouver, Washington; and Seattle/Tacoma, Washington. Adding a fourth location in Eastern Washington will provide even more geographic diversity.

Moses Lake was selected for the 2004 conference due to its accessibility via major North-South and East-West highways, availability of good facilities and other factors. The 2005 conference is tentatively scheduled for the Portland/Vancouver area. Future conferences will rotate among the four areas.

## NOAX wins 2003 Orr Technical Writing Award

(Editor's Note: H. Ward Silver, NOAX, is a member of the Pacific Northwest VHF Society and was a speaker at the joint Microwave Update 2003/Pacific Northwest VHF Conference last September. The following excerpts were taken, with permission, from the The ARRL Letter, Vol. 23, No. 09, February 27, 2004.

The ARRL Foundation has bestowed the 2003 Bill Orr, W6SAI, Technical Writing Award on QST Contributing Editor H. Ward Silver, N0AX, of Vashon Island, Washington. The action came during the foundation's annual meeting, held via teleconference February 12. The Foundation Board of Directors cited Silver's "fine technical series in QST and other League venues."

"I really am thrilled to win the award because I greatly admired the technical savvy and writing of Bill Orr," Silver said. "I still have several of his antenna books on my bookshelf. His Radio Handbooks were very helpful as companions to The ARRL Handbook, as well."

The award selection is made by the ARRL editorial staff, based on articles published in QST during 2003, that most exemplify the writing philosophy of Bill Orr—that articles should tell a technical "story" that appeals to a broad audience extending beyond those individuals who have a particular interest in the topic.

"Ward's got a great sense of how to write for beginners," said QST Editor Steve Ford, WB8IMY. "He can take a complicated subject and explain it to anyone. Another great strength is his sense of humor in his writing. Between those two strengths, he can make almost any subject palatable."

## Do you use the ARRL 7<sup>TH</sup> Call Area Incoming QSL Bureau?

Are you an amateur radio operator who is not a current user of the ARRL 7<sup>th</sup> Call Area Incoming QSL Bureau, operated under the auspices of the Willamette Valley DX Club? The QSL bureau is open to all amateurs with a '7' call (e.g., W7, K7 AK7, etc., but excluding Alaska or Hawaii calls), regardless of operator class. You do not have to be an ARRL member.

We currently have <u>thousands</u> of cards for hundreds of 7<sup>th</sup> call area amateurs in our dead files because no SASE'S [self-addressed stamped envelopes] are on file or there is no established credit with the bureau. Reasonable contact attempts are made using email addresses from QRZ and Buckmaster (and in some cases through post-cards), but many of these email addresses are not current and bounce.

If you are not a current bureau user, but have had contacts with amateurs outside the US, you may have cards in our dead files. Due to the high costs of mailing, most foreign amateurs accumulate and forward their cards in bulk to the ARRL HQ for redistribution or direct to the various US QSL bureaus.

To claim foreign QSL cards (including those from Canada) see the instructions and forms at <u>www.qsl.net/wvdxc</u>. No Internet capability? Follow the basic rule - keep at least two 6x9 or 5x7 SASE's on file with:

Have Internet capability and want to know the status of your account or if you have cards in the dead file? A list of the current bureau sorters, by alphabet letter, is at <u>www.wvdxc.org</u> under the <u>'W7 QSL Bureau'</u> button. Most volunteers have email addresses and can give you the status of your account.

Please note - ARRL rules allow for the disposal of dead file cards 90 days after reasonable efforts have been made to contact the affected amateur. Each sorter only has limited space for storing dead file cards.

We don't want to dispose of any cards that might be yours, so please, always keep at least one SASE on file with the bureau. Thanks.

# Authorized promotions, vendors require prior board approval

One of the benefits of belonging to an organization like the Pacific Northwest VHF Society is access to some special promotions, offers, etc. One example has been our highly successful group purchase program with Downeast Microwave. Another is the logo gear available through approved vendors listed on the society web site.

Each of these promotions or vendors has received approval from the PNWVHFS board of directors before being implemented. The board reviews proposals, sets guidelines for the vendors, etc. This ensures that members will receive quality items and that any misunderstandings can be resolved appropriately. Approved promotions and vendors are listed on the society web site so members will know about them.

Getting a special promotion or new vendor approved starts with the society's secretary-treasurer. A proposal should first be submitted to <u>secretary@pnwvhfs.org</u>. It will be reviewed to determine it there is enough information available for the board to make an informed decision. If additional information is required, the requestor will be asked to provide it. When the required information is in place, the secretary-treasurer will forward the proposal to the board of directors for their consideration. This is usually not a lengthy process; a week or two. Once a decision has been reached, the secretary-treasurer will notify the requestor. Last year, PNWVHFS joined with Microwave Update 2003 to host a joint three-day event. This was a big step up. More than 100 movers and shakers from the VHF, UHF and Microwave ranks came to Everett, Washington, for the event.

If you attended, you know the level of knowledge and expertise represented was amazing. There was also a great dinner on Saturday evening with lots of prizes awarded. Conversations lasted well into the "wee hours." The vendor displays, Friday evening indoor swap meet and Sunday morning tailgate swap meet put the frosting on the cake.

Wouldn't it be great to grow the Pacific Northwest VHF+ Conference into a similar annual event. Other groups hold full two-day and three-day conferences; most notably the Central States VHF Society, North East Weak Signal Society and the Southeastern VHF Society. There's no reason we can't do the same. It would take a little more organization and a bit more involvement of members (not a bad thing), but nothing that an organization the size of PNWVHFS shouldn't be able to accomplish. Let's give it some thought!

## **PNWVHFS** is #3 in membership

Just two-and-a-half years after it was formed, the Pacific Northwest VHF Society has become the third largest weak-signal VHF and above organization in the United States. This is according to available statistics found in the ARRL's Affiliated Clubs database and on nonaffiliated club web sites.

The largest VHF+ organization in the US is apparently the North Texas Microwave Society with 375 members. Central States VHF Society follows in second spot with 300 members and PNWVHFS is a solid third with 242 members...and still growing! Stay tuned.

## Editorial: Where do we go from here?

A solid foundation has been laid for the Pacific Northwest VHF Society over the past two-and-a-half years. The central core of the society was formed around the annual Pacific Northwest VHF Conference, started on an ad hoc basis a number of years ago by people who felt it was a good idea to meet periodically to share information and build relationships. We owe a debt of gratitude to those early organizers.

Since the society's formal founding in September 2001, a number of other enhancements have been added; among them a quality web site and e-mail reflector, ARRL affiliation and club competition entries, approved vendors of nametags and clothing items, a quarterly newsletter, periodic "group buys" of Downeast Microwave products, and impromptu "VHF breakfasts" in the Seattle and Spokane areas. The annual conference remains the primary focus, however.

Where do we go from here? Most of the guidance and direction of the new organization has fallen to a very small number of people. There is a real need to get more people involved. It is important for the society to mature into the kind of organization the MEMBERSHIP wants it to be...not what a few people may THINK the membership wants.

PNWVHFS currently has two elected officers; President and Secretary-Treasurer...and five elected board



members, one from each ARRL/RAC section. We need to hear from YOU regarding what YOU want the society to become. Please take a few minutes to think about this question and then contact your section director or one of the officers with your thoughts. Please remember that in addition to an idea for a new event or activity, there needs to be someone to make it happen.
